RSV Awareness Week couldn't come soon enough as cases surge





he Northern Territory vernment should follow the footsteps of Oueensland and Western Australia in stumping up the funds to subsidise an expensive jab that affects thousands of children each year.

Cases of Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) are on the up in the Northern Territory and the illness s currently expected to cost the nation about \$200m with an expected 12,000 infant patients

needing hospitalisation this year However, the Northern Territory is among four states and territories which do not offer a subsidy for the jab.

Each dose of the jab costs \$350, and already this year, cases in the orthern Territory have almost toubled from 599 in 2023 to 1000 n 2024

Ironically, in New South Wales the jab is only offered to habies if they meet three criteria: That

the jab. But there may be some hope on the horizon for parents across the ountry next month when the Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee - the federal vernment body which has the final say as to whether a medicine is subsidised or not - will consider the RSV iab.




